

# Webinar Food Insecurity and the Right to Food in BC

Thursday, November 26, 2020

Please join us on Thursday, November 26th from 2:00 PM to 3:30 PM Pacific time for an AMSSA webinar on Food Insecurity and the Right to Food in BC.

#### **About the Webinar:**

Food insecurity is the inadequate or insecure access to food due to financial limitations. Many people can't afford the quantity or quality of food needed for a healthy diet. It's a serious global issue that impacts over 4.4 million Canadians and over 500,000 British Columbians. Food insecurity contributes to inadequate nutrition. It negatively affects the physical and mental health of both adults and children. It affects vulnerable, low-income populations. As a result of the COVID-19 pandemic, many households are facing increased difficulties accessing nutritious foods.

This webinar features experts who share their knowledge, points of view, and work in food insecurity. Graham Riches, UBC Professor Emeritus and former Director of the UBC School of Social Work, is an internationally-recognized expert on food insecurity, social policy and the Right to Food. Sarah Kim is Coordinator of the Vancouver Neighbourhood Food Networks and an advocate for food and income security. Zahra Esmail is Executive Director of South Vancouver Neighbourhood House and her portfolio includes food security.

This webinar also introduces a new AMSSA BCSIS e-learning module on food insecurity from the macro level through to initiatives to improve food equity.

AMSSA's new **BCSIS** Informal English Language Learning podcast mini-series promotes the sharing of innovative practices and resources. The first podcast episode, **Everyday Adaptations for Innovative ELL Programming**, is available now on the AMSSA website Resource Centre at the following link:

For newcomers, English language skills are an important factor in successful settlement and integration. The flexibility of informal English training programs can be ideal for newcomers who are experiencing change and uncertainty and is essential for those who are ineligible for LINC. For service providers, creative, budget-friendly approaches to informal English language learning, including through online methods, are vital. In changeable times, there is greater need for flexibility, adaptability, and innovation. There is remarkable work being done, and value in sharing and learning from one another. That's what this podcast is all about.

In the podcast, four language training experts share their everyday adaptations for innovative informal language programming. They have taken many small ideas and used them to build successful programs that can be readily adapted. Podcast listeners can pick up ideas to try out at their agency. There's an audio-only version, a video version, and a corresponding Podcast Show Notes information sheet that provides links to the resources shared in the podcast.

#### **BC legal system**

COVID-19 and physical distancing rules have led to changes in BC's courts.

#### **Provincial Court**

•A First Appearance is an important step in a family law case, and it looks nothing like what most of us see on TV and in movies. Our new <u>First appearance in Provincial Court</u> page contains interactive content, including videos of good and bad examples, to explain what to expect in the courtroom and how the process works. It also helps people write a script they can follow, using the easy-to-use template provided. Having a script helps people use their time and the court's time effectively and make a successful first appearance, even if that first appearance is virtual, as most now are during COVID-19.

#### **Supreme Court**

•Starting October 26, 2020 in Vancouver, applications scheduled for hearing in Masters chambers (estimated at 2 hours or less) will be heard on Microsoft Teams. All other chambers applications in Vancouver will be by phone. This page provides information about the process.

#### Coping with Separation during COVID-19

This online-only updated edition booklet was developed to help people deal with the emotional aspects of separating.


It describes the emotional stages of separation and

suggests ways to cope during COVID-19, including how to:

- •recognize symptoms of stress using the checklist provided
- •deal with the uncertainty of the pandemic effects on living arrangements and financial situation during separation
- •reduce anxiety about the legal process as it evolves during COVID-19
- •reduce conflict and communicate with the other person to solve parenting and other issues during the pandemic
- •help children cope with their emotions and give them support during COVID-19

#### **Evolving government benefits**

The pandemic has created financial hardship for many British Columbians, and government services and benefits continue to evolve to meet changing needs. Legal Aid BC has updated information in several locations, including:

- •Q&A Family violence for people who need financial support so they can leave an abusive partner
- •Q&A Support for people having trouble making or receiving support payments

PEACE GEEKS

PeaceGeeks is excited to announce that the registration for Snapp (Skilled Newcomers and Professionals Partnership) Pilot 2 is now open! We are sharing the key pilot information and some of the changes from Pilot 1 below; and have included an email template for you to share with newcomers in your network.

The full overview of the pilot can be found on the **attached document**. We also prepared this social media kit and the attached poster for your ease in sharing the information with your network.

#### What is Snapp?

Snapp (Skilled Newcomers and Professionals Partnership) is a pilot program by PeaceGeeks that connects newcomers and local professionals in BC for 1:1 video calls to meet and share employment advice. The upcoming pilot will run from Nov 1 to Dec 11, 2020. Register by Nov 13 to participate!

#### Who is eligible to participate?

•Local professionals with at least two years of experience in their profession in BC

#### •Newcomers who:

- are one of the following: Permanent Residents of Canada; Refugee Claimants and Protected Persons as defined in Section 95 of the Immigration and Refugee Protection Act (IRPA);
- Individuals who have been selected, inside or outside Canada, to become permanent residents (pending verifications) and who have been informed, by a letter from Immigration,
- Refugees and Citizenship Canada; Convention refugees and protected persons outside Canada who have been selected for resettlement in Canada by Immigration, Refugees and
- Citizenship Canada; and Temporary foreign workers who hold or received approval of a work permit under section 112 of the Immigration and Refugee Protection Regulations (IRPR)
- or received initial approval for permanent residence under section 113 of the IRPR.
- have intermediate English communication skills, are able to complete the registration form on their own. We offer an option to match based on language (if a match is available), but a newcomer should expect to communicate in English for their meet-up.
- Professions: Snapp welcomes participants from all professions; however we are prioritizing our recruitment efforts in the technology and non-profit/social sectors. The professions available to select on our registration form include: software development, product management, project management, business analysis, data science, quality

#### Professions contd.

assurance, design, marketing, customer service, sales & business development, public relations & communications, human resources, operations, accounting & finance, administrative, manufacturing & distribution, education & training, planning & strategy, non-profit & social services, and civic & government. If a profession is not shown, registrants can include it in "Other". Note: acceptance into the pilot is not guaranteed and depends on availability of a match.

#### What's new in Pilot 2?

- This is our first public pilot where newcomers and local professional volunteers can register without being referred by a settlement agency. Feel free to share with your friends and other networks.
- *Matching*: In addition to profession and employment advice areas, our matching now also includes interests and language (optional).
- *Number of matches*: Participants can now select to meet up to 4 matches. Each match intended to be a one-time 1:1 meet-up for about 45-60 min.
- Vetting: We are reviewing all newcomer and local professional registrations before they are accepted into the pilot. All local professionals are asked to indicate if they were referred by an individual or an organization. Our primary recruitment method for volunteers is through company contacts so we will be prioritizing participants from employer partners or referred by other already verified participants. For newcomers, they are expected to have an intermediate level of English in order to be able to complete the registration form and are asked to indicate when they arrived in Canada. We also ask them to include a referring party and prioritize those who are referred.
